Nurseries and chapel are now open — Nurseries are now open for children, birth – 4 years. Room 105 is for birth until children are toilet trained and Room 103 is for toilet trained children through 4 years. The nurseries are open 8:45 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. on Sunday mornings. Families with young children are invited to worship in All Saints Chapel where children can move around and make noise.

Chapel update — Our chapel renovations and updates are complete, and we are excited to be able to use this space again. One of the updates was to install a t-coil hearing loop. If you have hearing aides your audiologist can help determine accessibility. We have two stand alone units for anyone who would like extra amplification.

Music — The recorder ensemble, Byrdsong, will perform a movement from Bach Cantata No. 79, and an ensemble from Trinity Voices will join the recorders during the Prelude. During the Offertory, the Chancel Choir will sing the Heavens are Telling from Haydn's masterwork The Creation (1797-1798). Soloists are Lyndsey Swann, Carter Timberlake and Wesley McCleary-Small. We begin a new series of Taizé pieces featuring soloists Emily Frye and Carter Timberlake, and the Postlude is an improvisation on the hymn tune Litton.
